TARONGA ZOO EXCURSION STAGE 2

On Tuesday the 17 of October, Years 3 and 4 visited Taronga Zoo. Year 3 and 4 staff would like to thank the huge group of parents who accompanied the excursion on the day. Without your help, our excursion would not have been possible.

Apart from seeing many amazing creatures, many students were encouraged to talk to the Zoo Keepers to help with their research projects. Below is an example of the work produced.

Interview With a Zoo Keeper

When Year 4 went to the zoo, we (Eric, Hugo, Ryan, Louis and Eddie) decided to visit the Lemur Forest Adventure Walk. In the enclosure we met a zookeeper who looked after the Lemurs. We asked a few questions about the lemurs like: "Were the black rings around its eyes for sun protection?" (Yes) and "Were the black and white rings around it's tail to fool their predators (most likely a bird of prey) to think they are a snake?" (Yes).

We talked to the zookeeper about how old they live for. In the wild it grows up to 14 to 15 years. In the zoo it is usually lives a few years older because they get better care and better health.

We asked the zookeeper, "Are the lemurs endangered?" The zookeeper said, "Yes, because of habitat loss in Madagascar."

She was very interesting to talk to.

SPORT NEWS STATE ATHLETICS CARNIVAL

The State Athletics Carnival was held on the 18th and 19th of October at Homebush Olympic Park. The Summer Hill Community should be extremely proud of our 7 students who represented not only our school but also the Sydney East Region at this highly competitive carnival competing against the best Primary School athletes State Wide.

Claudia M in year 4 represented Sydney East in the 800m. She said the competition was fierce and the atmosphere was exciting. Claudia knew a few of the competitors who were from the same region and had competed against them before. Claudia came 7th out of over 40 competitors in the Junior 800m!!

Alec H in year 5 represented Sydney East in Junior Boys High Jump. Alec said a number of the competitors had coaches in the stands providing tips to them between jumps, they also had specific spikes for High Jump and used different techniques. Alec did a great job against all those odds ranking in the top 20 out of over 60 boys!!

Liam K in year 6 represented Sydney East in the 11 years 100m and 200m. Making it through the heats and semis and into the finals. Liam will now be heading to Nationals for both sprints in December representing the NSW. Liam ran 13.02 seconds in his 100m finals race placing 1st, this being a personal and competition best!! He also ran a personal and competition best in the 200m running 26.97 seconds placing 3rd overall!!

Archie H in year 5 represented Sydney East in not only Discus but also Shot Put. He did an outstanding job against boys which towered over him in height. Archie pushed the Shot Put 9.41m, this being a competition best and placed him 9th out of over 40 competitors!! He also did a great job against the hard competition at State level in the Junior Boys Discus!!

Max R in year 6 represented the Sydney East Region in the Senior High Jump. There was a large number of competitors jumping against Max and when the pole went up to 1.6m, there was still 10 boys in the running. 6 boys were knocked out at 1.6, 2 boys shortly after. Max and his competitor both jumping at 1.63m being a personal and competition best for Max was placed 2nd when the officials counted back to see previous attempts!! Max will be heading to Nationals to represent the State in High Jump!!

Nick W, Casper Y, Max R and Liam K all in year 6 represented the Sydney East Region in the 4×100 m Relay. As the reports came into the school the staff waited nervously to see the end result. They placed 3^{rd} in the heats, 4^{th} in the semi-finals and 9^{th} in the final!! They were one of 2 Sydney East teams to make the finals!!

Mr Williams and Mrs Allen would like to thank the parents for all of their hard work. Whether it was driving their children to or from training, to the Regionals followed by the State carnival.

To the highly athletically skilled students who represented our school, zone and region, you should feel extremely proud of one another as you worked hard training after school, during the school holidays and competed gallantly making the entire school community very proud!

The students and Mrs Allen would like to say a massive thank you to Mr Williams for organising equipment before and after school so that the group would not have to carry it down daily and for volunteering to assist after school. Miss Ma additional thanks for timing students and providing additional supervision.

Project update

aware. Ausarid is planning to replace ou As you may be aware, Ausgrid is planning to replace our substation in Summer Hill as the existing facility is ready to be retired. The existing substation entered service in 1966 and Ausgrid is planning to build the replacement substation on adjoining land at 14A and 14B James Street and 238 and 240 Old Canterbury Road to maintain a reliable electricity supply into the future.

Ausgrid presented concept designs for the new Summer Hill substation to the community in November 2016. Following several stages of community engagement and planning, we are now preparing the environmental assessment and detailed design.

Before this can begin, the existing structures at th proposed new substation site need to be demolished. This will enable Ausgrid to complete site investigations. This information is required for the environmental assessment, project approval process and detailed design phase.

This newsletter contains a project update and information about the next stages of the project

Ausgrid has been seeking feedback from the local community throughout the planning and design process. Thank you to everyone who has provided feedback to date.
