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The Role of the P&C

The Summer Hill Public School Parents and Citizens Association (P&C) is an incorporated body under the Parents and Citizens Associations Incorporation Act 1976. We are a not for profit organisation and a registered charity that promotes the interests of the school by bringing parents, teachers and students into close cooperation.

We also:

- · assist the school by providing facilities and equipment through fundraising
- promote the recreation and welfare of our children
- encourage parent participation in school
- · act as a forum to share information to benefit the school community
- · advocate for local educational improvements
- promote public education.

We do this by:

- meeting to discuss relevant issues either raised by the P&C or by the school at meetings on the 3rd Tuesday of each month during term
- giving our time through working on committees, volunteering at events and representing the parents on school committees and panels
- organising events to publicly celebrate and engage with the school community.

The Annual Report outlines initiatives and events held during the year. It also provides a statement of the P&C's finances including an audit report and it also celebrates our successes during 2020.

President's Report - 2020

Summer Hill Public School has a wonderfully diverse and engaged community where parents and carers, teachers, students, and local people come together to support the many and varied P&C activities.

Firstly, a big thank you from the P&C to all teachers for working through a pandemic and at times teaching both at school and online. Also, a big thank you to all parents for the period of home schooling. You all get an A+.

This year many of our most popular P&C events, including the School Fair, Mothers and Special People breakfast, Fathers and Special People breakfast, gardening bees, Parent Night, Earth Disco and Music performances, have unfortunately been cancelled due to the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

2020 has been full of surprises that no one has ever asked for.

The year started with the bushfires raging across Australia, reportedly burning 18.6 million hectares and killing 1 billion animals.

The challenges of 2020 only continued, when the coronavirus, a respiratory disease also known as COVID-19, prompted schools to shut down and parents were responsible for home learning. Employees began working remotely, and people were advised to remain inside their homes in an attempt to contain the spread of the disease. Pleasingly, there have been zero cases at the school to-date - which is a testament to the school, parents and carers, students and the wider community.

Many events were cancelled and children only returned to school mid-way through the year - leaving parents concerned about their educational and social skills. However, our children proved they are resilient, and they picked up where they left off in the playground and in the classroom.

Summer Hill Public School was guided by the NSW Department of Education, and full-time face-to-face learning commenced from the 25 May 2020. However, physical distancing requirements were put in place for adults and many of these restrictions remain in place for everyone's safety.

We were reminded more than ever that parents and carers were not to send children to school if they are unwell, even if they have the mildest flu-like symptoms. Students with flu-like symptoms are still required to be tested and provide a copy of a negative COVID-19 test result (and be symptom free) before returning to school.

Everyone has been impacted by these new health and safety requirements. We have seen an increase in teachers using the "Dojo" App to share students' activities and assemblies - allowing us a window into school life. The P&C has responded to the challenge and began online "Zoom" meetings in June. Also, we saw our second hand uniform shop go on-line, with a great group of new volunteers leading our exciting new e-commerce platform.

As the P&C Federation stresses: The best outcomes are when the school "sees the parents as partners in the education process, have a right and a responsibility to play an active role in the education of their children".

The P&C encourages transparency about the direction the school is heading with teaching staff in 2021. We look forward to continued involvement in holistic and positive educational experiences for the children.

We would like to thank all departing teachers and welcome new teaching staff to our school and community. Thank you to the parents who represented the P&C on school panel selections, as well as to volunteers who have given their time throughout the school year.

The P&C is very pleased to be able to continue to support the school through the provision of funds (raised in previous years) to purchase learning resources and to contribute toward the upgrade of the multicourt.

We are also pleased to report that all funds provided under a community volunteer grant have been acquitted (prior to their expiry in December 2020). Funds were used to replace six damaged gazebos, acquire a new portable sound system, purchase eight new point of sale terminals (to enable cashless events), replenish our non-disposable cutlery/crockery collection and provide equipment for future events including tools for future gardening bees.

Events

Despite Covid restrictions, our Fundraising and Events Committee had a very successful year working alongside the fabulous Event Coordinators to create some amazing community building events and showing wonderful innovation to adapt to the changed circumstances of 2020.

In February, we held a **New Families Welcome Breakfast** for new parents and carers, arranged by Sophie Spinks; and the **Music Committee** held an introductory afternoon (with afternoon tea) for new Training Band and Training Orchestra members and their music tutors. This included a mini-concert for parents at the end.

In March, the **Sustainability & Gardening Committee arranged a very successful** National Ride to School. It was heartening to see so many kids arriving to school by bicycle and scooter

At the end of August, The Gender and Inclusion Committee organised 'Wear It Purple Day' with a band welcoming students to school; and this was followed in September by the school organising an innovative new Art Show, where every pupil's artwork was available in an online gallery and selected art works were hung from the school fence to display to the community in a Covid-safe way. Many thanks to the educators and volunteers who worked on this.

September also saw the **Crunch** 'n' **Sip challenge** organised by the Sustainability and Gardening Committee and congratulations to class 2AD for winning the contest.

And in October, the school arranged a 'Spooky Day' in place of the disco, and the P&C contributed the always-essential lollies for the occasion!

Sub - Committees

Sustainability & Gardening

In the last two years the Sustainability and Gardening Committees have combined together. The Sustainability Committee contributes to reducing the environmental footprint of the school and P&C events, and educating the school community about sustainable living, with activities to encourage recycling and composting, waste free lunchboxes, riding or walking to school, saving energy and water and conserving native plants and animals.

The Gardening Committee contributes to upkeep of the school grounds with up to four gardening bees annually and upgrading school facilities such as play equipment, seating, groundcover and planting.

Our Gardening and Sustainability Committee managed to hold two events in 2020. We ran a successful National Ride to School Day with lots of kids and parents riding and scooting to school. The fun school Crunch 'n' Sip challenge was run again to encourage waste free lunches and healthy eating. We continued to support the school's various environmental programs from a distance, including liaising with Inner West Council to review the solar power opportunities for the school. We look forward to recommencing the garden working bees next year and have restocked our supplies. We hope to continue to support sustainability at the P&C events and provide great spaces for our kids to play and learn.

Qualification

The level of documentation and record keeping of the Summer Hill Parents & Citizens Association is deemed sufficient for an opinion to be formed on the financial statements and all supporting documentation.

Opinion

In my opinion, the financial report of Summer Hill Public School Parents & Citizens Association presents a true and fair view of the financial position as at 30 November 2020. The financial report includes comparative figures to compare the financial performance of the year ended 30 November 2020 to the year ended 30 November 2019. It should be noted that the originally published balance sheet as at 30 November 2019 included an error that has been subsequently rectified. The comparative balance sheet attached accurately details the position of asset and equity accounts.
